RE: Answers to follow-up questions from the Hardin County Work Camp Closure Hearing

Below you will find a series of questions and answers that are in response to the follow-up letter dated July 21, 2015 that we received after testifying at COGFA hearing regarding the proposed closure of the Hardin County Work Camp.

1. It was indicated plans are to close the Hardin County Work Camp by December, 2015. Can DOC please provide the Commission the step by step dates and actions which will need to take place to close this facility?

Response: Please see attached documents entitled IDOC Administrative Directive 01.02.150 and Hardin County Work Camp Closure Timeline.

2. Please provide the recidivism rate for the Hardin County Work Camp as well as the other work camps in the DOC system.

It was stated at the hearing that all 61 employees at the Hardin County Work Camp could be placed in positions available Shawnee and Vienna - could you please outline how this will be attained and the impact that any "bumping rights" will have on this plan?

Response: There are 25 vacancies at Shawnee and 42 at Vienna, which brings up a total of 67 vacancies at the present time. For layoff and bumping procedures, please see Article XX Section 3 of the AFSCME contract.

6. Can you provide a breakdown of the \$9.8 million estimated deferred maintenance which was indicated to include repairs to the kitchen at the Hardin County Work Camp that was damaged by the fire? It was stated this list was completed by CDB in FY2009 - is there an update to this list? If so, please provide the list for all DOC facilities? Are these considered a "wish list" or do all the items listed need to be immediately completed keep facilities operational? Can you provide a minimum estimated cost to the Hardin County Work Camp operational using in-house DOC skilled labor?

Response: Please see the two attached files named VFA Deferred Maintenance Analysis for Hardin County Work Camp and Final Survey for Hardin County CDB Project 120.265.R01. Please note that only three of the facility's ten buildings were surveyed and listed on the VFA analysis report, which was compiled in 2007. There are no updates to the projects listed and no surveys of the other seven buildings at the facility. This is primarily because the Capital Development Board (CDB) has not visited the facility because of a lack of capital funding and competing capital priorities throughout the Department. As for the total number of competing priorities, note that in the Governor's FY16 capital request the total amount of deferred maintenance at the Illinois Department of Corrections totaled approximately \$1.7 billion. To put this in perspective, please see the attached file named IDOC Capital Request by Facility which lists approximately 223 projects and encapsulates approximately one-quarter of our total need. With this much deferred maintenance in our Department, there is no "wish list." Everything requested is a necessity to ensure the health, life, and safety for staff and offenders, help achieve energy and operational savings, and prevent emergent issues that may compromise public safety. With respect to Hardin County, there has been no scope submitted by in-house labor that would bring Hardin County up to recommended safety standards. Instead, the aforementioned scope found in the attached document identifies approximately \$1.6 million in capital upgrades, including architect and engineering designs that needs to be completed in order to address the most emergent issues. This Hardin County report was compiled in 2009.

7. Can you provide the Commission with the status of FOIA requests related to Hardin County Work Camp that have been received in the last 90 days?

Response: Over the last 90 days, IDOC has only received one FOIA related to Hardin County Work Camp. That FOIA was sent to the Department on July 23, 2015 at 3:36pm. As of the date of this response, the Department is reviewing the FOIA request and compiling the appropriate response.

8. Can we get a breakdown of the estimated \$25,000 cost to maintain the 15 acre Hardin County Work Camp if it is closed? Can you provide a list of all the critical tasks that will be necessary as part of the maintenance? What will happen to the bee hives? Will the gardens be maintained?

Please see below for estimated "mothballing" costs:

- Gas and oil for vehicles providing maintenance and spot-checks \$1,000
- Weed spray, trimmer line, miscellaneous commodities \$250
- Incidentals \$3,750
- Minimum utility charges \$20,000

9. Can you provide a copy of the contract for the portable kitchen that is currently used at the Hardin County Work Camp? How was the contract procured? Why has DOC not moved forward with making the current kitchen operational instead of continuing to pay \$13,000 per month for a portable kitchen?

Response: Please see attached file named Kitchens To Go Contract for Hardin County. The contract method for procurement was a competitive solicitation known as an invitation for bid (IFB) and at a cost of \$11,500 per month not including propane. IDOC worked with CDB on the funding estimates to fix the kitchen, but due to the lack of capital funding there was nothing made available to make the repairs.

10. Please provide a comparison of the cost to house an inmate at each DOC as opposed to a work camp.

11. Which counties will be the most impacted by the closure of the Hardin County Work Camp and can you provide an economic impact related only to these counties?

Response: The Department followed up with Dr. Hewings from the University of Illinois' Regional Economics Applications Laboratory in an effort to help answer this question. His response when looking at the impact based upon an unknown quantity, if any, of employees that would be moving from their current residences was "*if no one will lose his/her job, but the site of the job will change, then there is virtually little or no impact. If people re-locate, then there will probably be a redirection of expenditures from their salaries in the new location. But, to measure this, we would need to know how many.*"

12. What percent of inmates are high school dropouts? How many obtain their high school degree or equivalent while being incarcerated?

Response: The Department is unable to obtain this information given the limitations of our IT infrastructure and manual resources that would need to be redirected to gathering this information.

13. Please provide specifics as to why current skilled labor on DOC payroll cannot be used to make the Hardin County Work Camp kitchen operational? We understand that equipment and supplies which exceed \$10,000 may require competitive bidding or use of master contracts maintained by CMS, but we do not understand why skilled labor employed by DOC cannot be used to make repairs. If they cannot be used for maintenance and repairs at DOC facilities, what do they do? Secretary of State employs skilled laborers who provide maintenance, repairs, and construction needed in buildings located at the Capital Complex on a daily basis. How is this different from the skilled labor employed by DOC?

Response: IDOC does employ skilled labor professionals and uses them daily. However, they do not complete major design and/or construction projects and none of the skilled labor professionals at IDOC submitted a project scope or request to repair Hardin County for the quoted amount of \$10,000. Instead, facility staff requested the project be handled by CDB as a capital project. For a project of this magnitude and the scope of work included, the project would require design work from outside architects/engineers and then skilled labor would come in and complete the work. This would all need to be bid out through a competitive and transparent process, as outlined by the Illinois Procurement Code.

I. <u>POLICY</u>

A. <u>Authority</u>

730 ILCS 5/3-2-2

44 Illinois Administrative Code 5010.410

B. Policy Statement

All offices, divisions, and bureaus within the department shall coordinate activities to effectuate timely and orderly closing of facilities.

II. <u>PROCEDURE</u>

A. <u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of this directive is to establish a written procedure to ensure all aspects of closing a facility are administered.

B. <u>Applicability</u>

This directive is applicable to all divisions and bureaus within the Department.

C. Internal Audits

An internal audit of this directive is not required.

D. <u>Designees</u>

Individuals specified in this directive may delegate stated responsibilities to another person or persons unless otherwise directed.

E. <u>Definition</u>

Deputy Director – means the Deputy Director or the District Deputy Director.

Facility - includes state-owned or leased office space, program sites, or correctional facilities.

F. <u>Requirements</u>

- 1. The appropriate Deputy Director of any closing facility shall be responsible for all phases of closing a facility.
- 2. As soon as practicable after notice of closing a facility is received, a written plan for all phases of closing the facility shall be established by the Deputy Director and submitted to the Associate Director and the Director for approval. The plan shall include, but is not limited to:

- a. Transfer of offenders to other facilities.
- b. Transfer or layoff of employees.
- c. Proper disposition of employee and offender files.
- d. Inventory and disposal of state property in accordance with applicable directives, including computer equipment.
- e. Reconciliation of all financial books and records.
- f. Cash audit of all locally held funds performed by the Fiscal Internal Audit Unit.
- g. Proper disposition of locally held funds, including.
 - (1) Transfer of trust fund accounts to the appropriate facilities.
 - (2) Transfer of benefit funds and the Travel and Allowance fund to the facility designated by the Director.
 - (3) Proper disposition of commissary inventories and transfer of the commissary fund balance to the facility designated by the Director.
 - (4) Completion of bank signature authority cards for Division of Finance personnel to use for closure of bank accounts, if appropriate.
- h. Completion of a Fixed Assets Report (C-15) and Report of Receipts and Disbursements (C-17) by Division of Finance staff after the facility closes.
- i. Transferal of vital records for safekeeping in accordance with the State Records Act.
- Collection and proper disposal of keys or other items assigned to facility employees in accordance with Administrative Directive 01.02.155, Procedure for Transfer or Separation of Employees.
- k. Discontinuance of utilities or service, as appropriate.
- I. Termination of contracts/leases, as appropriate.
- m Securing the facility.
- n. Notifying the U.S. Post Office of the appropriate forwarding address.
- o. Notification to local law enforcement, emergency services, and State's Attorney.
- 3. Upon approval of the plan, the Deputy Director shall notify other division heads of the closing date and request any services required.
- 4. The Manager of Management Information Systems shall also develop a plan for coordinating removal and disconnection of all computer equipment, including revocation of computer sign-ons. The plan shall be approved by the appropriate Deputy Director and the Associate Deputy Director.

- 5. All manuals containing rules, regulations, policies, procedures, etc. shall be returned to the office responsible for distributing same within the Department. This provision does not apply to local policy and procedures manuals. One copy of local policy and procedures manuals shall be retained in accordance with the approved records retention schedule.
- 6. An inventory of controlled property shall be conducted as close to the scheduled closing date as possible. All property shall be accounted for with proper property control documentation showing all transfers or deletions from inventory. The final inventory shall be forwarded to the Division of Finance, Procurement Section for submission to the Central Management Services (CMS) Property Control Division.

August 31, 2015 Provide AFSCME, ISEA Local 2002, and INA formal notice of layoff (30 day notice required).

September 14, 2015 Provide each employee notice of layoff, including seniority roster, vacancy list, and bump options (5 day notice required).

September 21-25, 2015 Hold Individual Meetings at the work site with all employees to discuss layoff options.

September 28, 2015 Submit Final Layoff Plan to Director of Central Management Services.

October 12, 2015 Final Layoff Notices sent by Central Management Services (10 work day notice required).

November 2, 2015 through December 31, 2015 Employees may be transferred to new work locations as operational needs allow

FACILITY/BUILDING DESCRIPTION:

The Dormitory & Kitchen (C5001) is a 13,700 square foot, one-story building constructed in 1983.

PROJECT PROBLEM DESCRIPTION:

Damage and heavy use have contributed to the deterioration of building components and equipment throughout the existing kitchen, dry storage room, showers and toilet rooms.

PROJECT SCOPE:

The scope of work provides for renovating the existing kitchen, dry storage and shower/toilet rooms.

BUDGET SURVEY RECOMMENDATIONS:

Discipline: Architectural

Discussion:

There is an emergency project addressing immediate needs at the existing kitchen. This survey document identifies the remaining needs in the kitchen and shower/toilet rooms. Re-design of the kitchen should be included, to provide for modern equipment and current professional processes. Temporary kitchen facilities required during the construction phase of this project are not included in this survey document.

Kitchen / Dry Storage / Office

1. Remove all existing kitchen equipment and remove existing interior partitions and ceiling.

2. Provide a new concrete slab, foundation and exterior walk-in cooler/freezer adjacent to the existing

building. Prepare an opening through the existing exterior wall to provide access to the new walk-in cooler/freezer from the existing kitchen. Connect to existing utilities under new slab.

3. Replace the existing screen panels and framing at the screen porch. Paint all trim at the porch.

4. Provide new 6" thick concrete block partitions in the renovated kitchen and new hollow metal doors & frames. Provide a fixed glass window at the kitchen manager's office. Provide trim and flashing at the new opening to the walk-in cooler/freezer. Patch quarry tile floors as necessary.

5. Provide a new gypsum board ceiling on plywood, all suspension/fastening equipment, access panels and attachments. Integrate new lighting (see "Electrical") with the new ceiling. Paint all new walls, ceilings, doors and frames.

6. Provide new kitchen equipment, including steamers, grill, kettles, fryer, mixer, ice-maker, range/oven combo, dishwasher, 3-compartment sink, hot & cold food tables and portable hot boxes.

Toilet 1

7. Remove existing quarry tile floor and panel ceiling.

8. Provide a new tile floor, membrane, epoxy grout and moisture-resistant gypsum board ceiling on plywood. Integrate new lighting (see "Electrical") with the new ceiling.

9. Prep and paint existing concrete block walls.

10. Provide new security mirrors (polished stainless steel) and shelves at each sink.

Shower 1

11. Remove existing quarry tile floor and panel ceiling.

12. Provide a new tile floor, membrane, epoxy grout and cement plaster ceiling. Integrate new lighting (see "Electrical") with the new ceiling.

13. Prep and paint existing concrete block walls.

Toilet/Shower 2

- 14. Remove existing quarry tile floor and panel ceiling.
- 15. Provide a new tile floor, membrane and epoxy grout.
- 16. Provide a moisture-resistant gypsum board ceiling on plywood in the toilet area.
- 17. Provide a cement plaster ceiling in the shower area.
- 18. Integrate new lighting (see "Electrical") with the new ceiling.
- 19. Provide new concrete block walls at the corridor, 48 inches high.
- 20. Prep and paint all concrete block walls.
- 21. Provide new security mirrors (polished stainless steel) and shelves at each sink.

TOTAL ARCHITECTURAL COST: \$927,400

Discipline: Mechanical

Discussion:

The existing walk-in freezer is too small for daily meal storage required by the facility. A new 20' x 20' freezer is required. Dry Cooler ventilation does not meet code. The existing Stero Hobart dishwasher has not worked and is beyond repair. The existing range hood fire protection system is inoperable. Also, the shower room heads, drains and the lavatories are original and in need of replacement.

Recommendations:

- 1. Provide one mop sink for new janitor closet.
- 2. Provide new kitchen range hood fire protection.
- 3. Rehab existing single toilet with new toilet and exhaust fan (security fixtures, 100 cfm).
- 4. Provide new exhaust ventilation for existing dry walk-in cooler (300 cfm).

5. Provide new shower heads, lavatories with faucets, and floor drains for the Unit 1 and also the Units 2 & 3 shower/restrooms. Provide security fixtures. (Unit 1: 8 shower heads, 8 lavs, 2 new floor drains with 25 lf of saw-cut and replace imbedded drains. Unit 2-3: 12 shower heads, 16 lavs, 4 floor drains with 40 lf of saw-cut and replacement of imbedded drains.)

TOTAL MECHANICAL COST: \$58,200

Discipline: Electrical

Discussion:

Neither the dietary nor the toilet/shower areas have been renovated since 1980. The electrical system is undersized. The lighting is poor and dim. This project will totally renovate the electrical system with all new equipment including power, lighting and fire alarm systems in the dietary and toilet/shower areas. All light fixtures will be security-type fixtures. The existing 400 amp panel will remain. A new 400 amp, 42 circuit panel will be added.

Recommendations:

- 1. Complete demolition of electrical system in the dietary and toilet/shower areas.
- 2. Provide a new 400 amp, 3 phase, 42 circuit, 120/208 volt panelboard.
- 3. Replace all lighting with new energy efficient security type fluorescent fixtures.
- 4. Replace all existing wiring in the dietary and toilet/shower areas.
- 5. Replace and add emergency lighting.
- 6. Replace and add exit lighting.
- 7. Provide updated, code compliant fire alarm devices for the areas.

- 4.3 SUBCONTRACTING: For purposes of this section, subcontractors are those specifically hired to perform all or part of the work covered by the contract. Vendor must receive prior written approval before use of any subcontractors in the performance of this contract. Illinois Attorney General, Vendor shall assign to the State rights, title and interest in and to the claim or cause of action.
