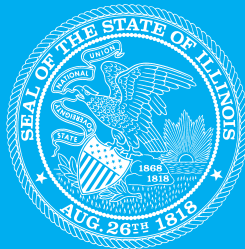

Introduction

The Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability is pleased to present the eighth edition of its *County Data Book*. This reference collects in one place the major demographic, economic, and political statistics for each county. It is intended for legislators and others who want to become more familiar with the state of Illinois and its counties.

Part 1 describes Illinois as a whole and contains maps shaded to show some important data about counties. Part 2 gives a separate compilation of statistics for each county. Part 3 ranks all counties for most of these statistics. Part 4 contains our sources and methodology, as well as the appendices. The appendices list counties by representative, legislative, and Congressional districts. Any suggestions for additions and improvements are appreciated.

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Part 1

Illinois in Perspective

POPULATION

The 2020 Census indicated that Illinois' population declined, between 2010 and 2020, for the first time in its history (-18,124 or -0.14%). This decrease contrasted with national growth of 7.4%, and was the lowest rate of population change for Illinois since when its population grew only 0.036% from 1980 to 1990. However, the Post Enumeration Survey (PES) by the Census Bureau after the 2020 Census found that Illinois' population was likely undercounted by nearly 2% (approximately 252,000). That was a midpoint estimate, implying that Illinois' population may have been undercounted by as many as 440,000 (3.43%) or as few as 65,000 (0.51%). Adding the Bureau's midpoint estimate to its official Census count for 2020 results in an estimated actual 2020 population of about 13,065,000.

The 2020 official count indicated that Illinois' share of the total U.S. population declined slightly by 0.3 percentage points. Cook County's population reversed course, rising 1.6% from 2010 to 2020. There were modest population gains (around 1.5%) in counties near Cook. Downstate counties saw an overall population drop of 3.3%. In actual numbers, Cook County rose 80,866; the 5 "collar" counties adjoining it gained 48,350; and the other 96 counties lost 147,340. Overall, 87 counties lost population, an increase from 61 counties in the 2010 Census. The greatest percentage growth was once again in Kendall County in northeastern Illinois, up 14.9%. The largest decrease was in Alexander County (the state's southernmost county), which was down -36.4%. (See *Map 1* on page 5.)

The 2020 Census showed Illinois with slightly smaller proportions than the nation as a whole of races other than Black and White, and a median age matching the national median. Educationally, Illinois was below the national average in the percentage of its population with bachelor's degrees, but above the national average for those with at least high school diplomas, or with graduate or professional degrees.

ELECTIONS

More voters have taken Democratic than Republican primary ballots in every statewide election since 2016. Democratic candidates carried the state in each gubernatorial and presidential election from 2016 on. Democratic voters outnumber Republicans in Cook County and all collar counties except McHenry County. Outside the collar counties, counties with relative Democratic strength include Champaign, Rock Island, and St. Clair. Republicans have majorities in the remaining counties and are particularly dominant in central and southern Illinois. DeKalb, Kendall, and Peoria Counties voted for Democratic candidates at the top of the ticket at all elections over the last 10 years, except in 2014. In elections over the last 10 years, except 2014, only Jackson, McLean, and Winnebago Counties have changed between Republican and Democratic majorities.

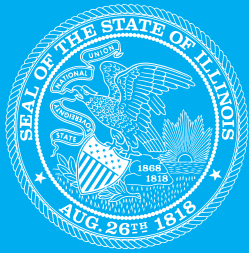

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COMMISSION OVERVIEW

The Commission on Government Forecasting & Accountability is a bipartisan legislative support service agency responsible for advising the Illinois General Assembly on economic and fiscal policy issues and for providing objective policy research for legislators and legislative staffs. The Commission’s board is comprised of twelve legislators—split evenly between the House and Senate and between Democrats and Republicans. Effective December 10, 2018, pursuant to P.A. 100-1148 the former Legislative Research Unit was merged into the Commission.

The Commission has three internal units—Revenue, Pensions, and Research, each of which has a staff of analysts and researchers who analyze policy proposals, legislation, state revenues & expenditures, and benefit programs, and who provide research services to members and staff of the General Assembly. The Commission’s staff fulfills the statutory obligations set forth in the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability Act (25 ILCS 155/), the State Debt Impact Note Act (25 ILCS 65/), the Illinois Pension Code (40 ILCS 5/), the Pension Impact Note Act (25 ILCS 55/), the State Facilities Closure Act (30 ILCS 608/), the State Employees Group Insurance Act of 1971 (5 ILCS 375/), the Public Safety Employee Benefits Act (820 ILCS 320/), the Legislative Commission Reorganization Act of 1984 (25 ILCS 130/), and the Reports to the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability Act (25 ILCS 110/).

- The **Revenue Unit** issues an annual revenue estimate, reports monthly on the state’s financial and economic condition, and prepares bill analyses and debt impact notes on legislation having a financial impact on the State. The Revenue Unit also provides caucus staffs with valuation analyses of proposals or funding scenarios being considered. The Unit publishes a number of statutorily mandated reports, as well as on-demand reports, including the *Monthly Briefing* newsletter and annually, the *Budget Summary*, *Capital Plan Analysis*, *Illinois Economic Forecast Report*, *Wagering in Illinois Update*, and *Liabilities of the State Employees’ Group Insurance Program*, among others. The Unit’s staff also fulfills the agency’s obligations set forth in the State Facilities Closure Act.
- The **Pension Unit** prepares pension impact notes on proposed pension legislation and publishes several statutorily mandated reports including the *Financial Condition of the Illinois State Retirement Systems*, the *Financial Condition of Illinois Public Pension Systems* and the *Fiscal Analysis of the Downstate Police & Fire Pension Funds in Illinois*. The Unit’s staff also fulfills the statutory responsibilities set forth in the Public Safety Employee Benefits Act.
- The **Research Unit** primarily performs research and provides information as may be requested by members of the General Assembly or legislative staffs. The Unit maintains a research library and, per statute, collects information concerning state government and the general welfare of the state, examines the effects of constitutional provisions and previously enacted statutes, considers public policy issues and questions of state-wide interest, and tracks appointments to State boards and commissions. Additionally, the Unit publishes *First Reading*, a quarterly newsletter, *Abstracts of State Reports*, a monthly bulletin which includes abstracts of annual reports or special studies from other state agencies, the *Illinois Tax Handbook for Legislators*, *Federal Funds to State Agencies*, various reports detailing appointments to State Boards and Commissions, the *1970 Illinois Constitution Annotated for Legislators*, the *Roster of Illinois Legislators*, and numerous special topic publications.

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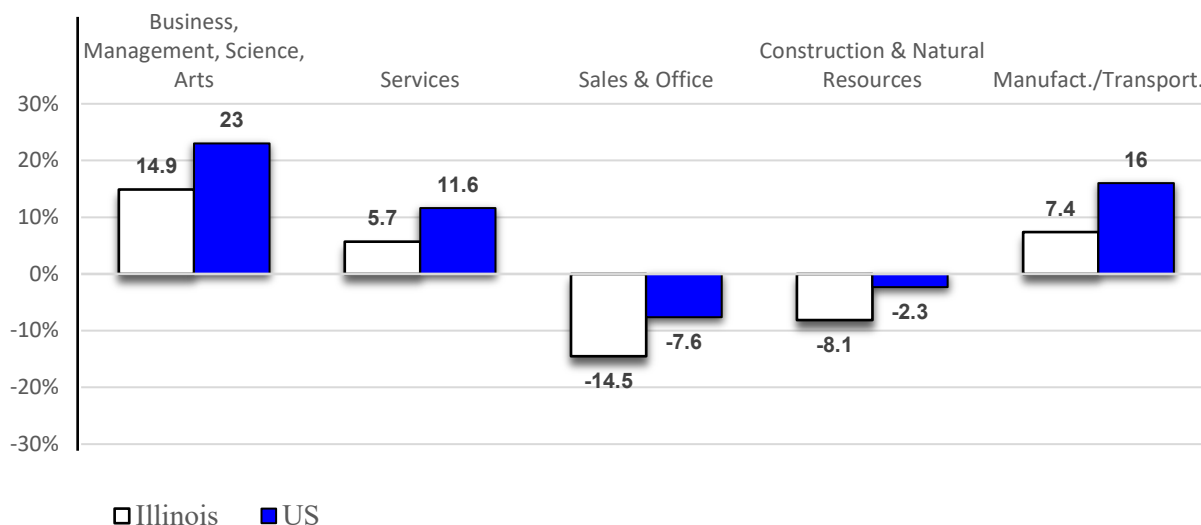
Employment by Industry

The distribution of jobs by kind of industry in Illinois is very similar to the national distribution. The largest increases from 2010 to 2020, both in Illinois and nationally, were in health care, education, and social services. Illinois showed a decline of 15.3% in total jobs from 2010 to 2020, while the national figure increased 2.0%. Illinois' percentage change in every category lagged behind the national total. The largest decrease in Illinois was in manufacturing and transportation (-29.6%), while the largest decrease nationally was in construction (-25.3%).

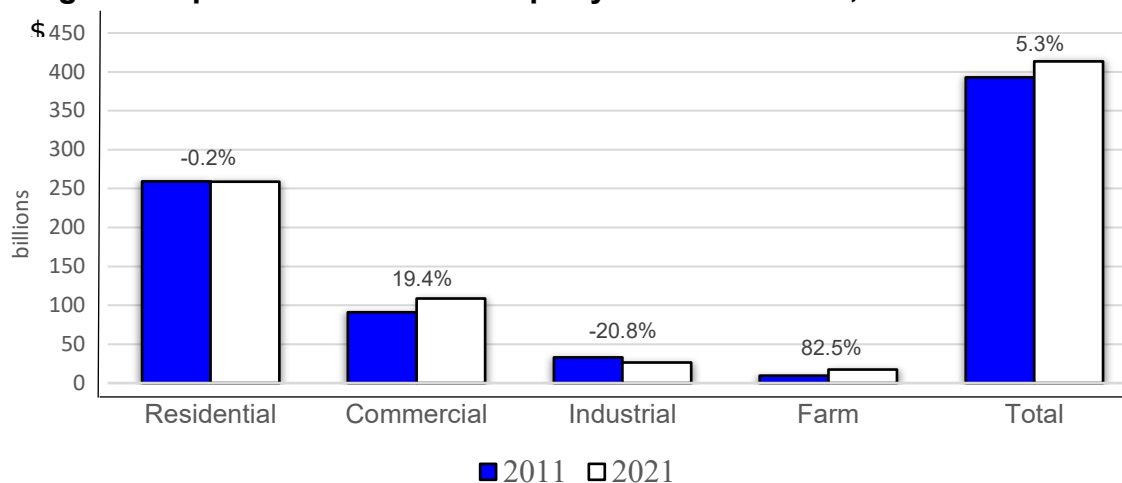
LAND USE

A striking feature about land in Illinois in recent years has been increases in the value of farmland from 2011 to 2021, with figures from that time showing an increase over 82.5%. Values of residential property (based on equalized assessed value) actually declined very slightly but still represents nearly two-thirds of the equalized assessed value of all property in the state. Industrial property showed the largest decline in equalized assessed value—about -20%. (As stated in Part 3 of this publication, assessed values represent only a fraction of the market value of real estate. Also, that fraction varies based on the type of real estate and whether it is in Cook County, which has different assessment rates than other counties. Thus, the numbers below should not be interpreted as accurately comparing the market values of different types of real estate in Illinois.)

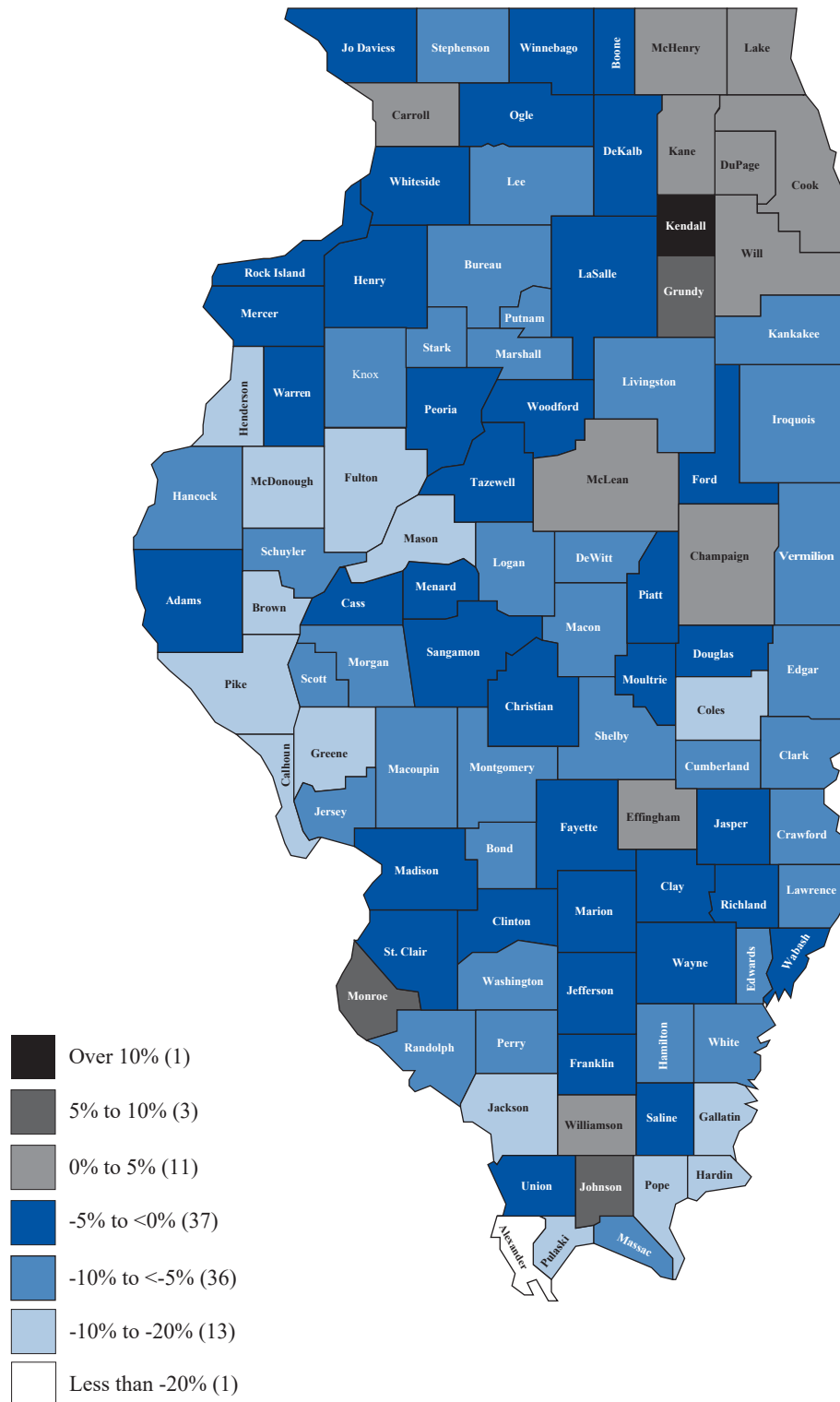

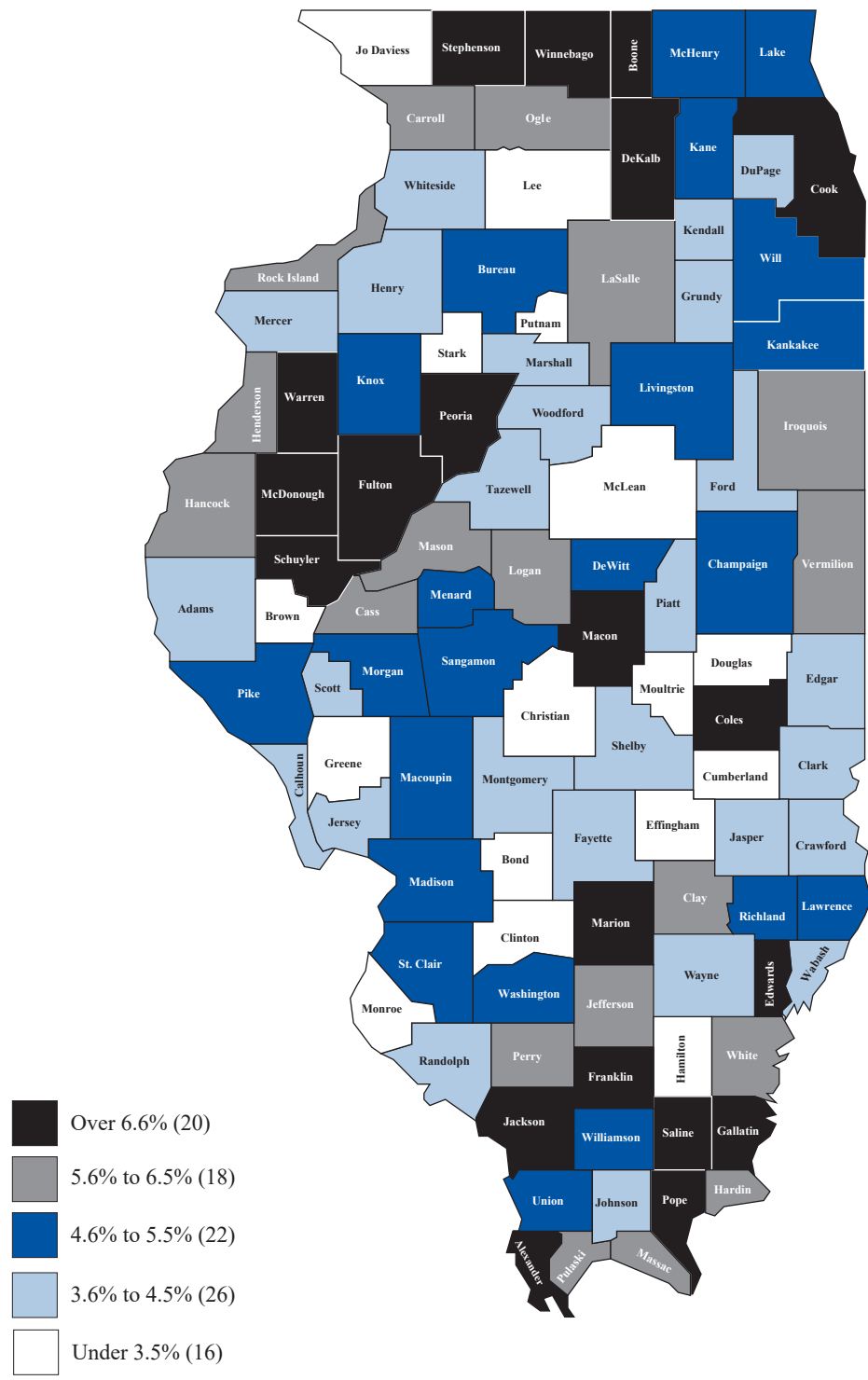
Changes in Equalized Assessed Property Value in Illinois, 2011 to 2021



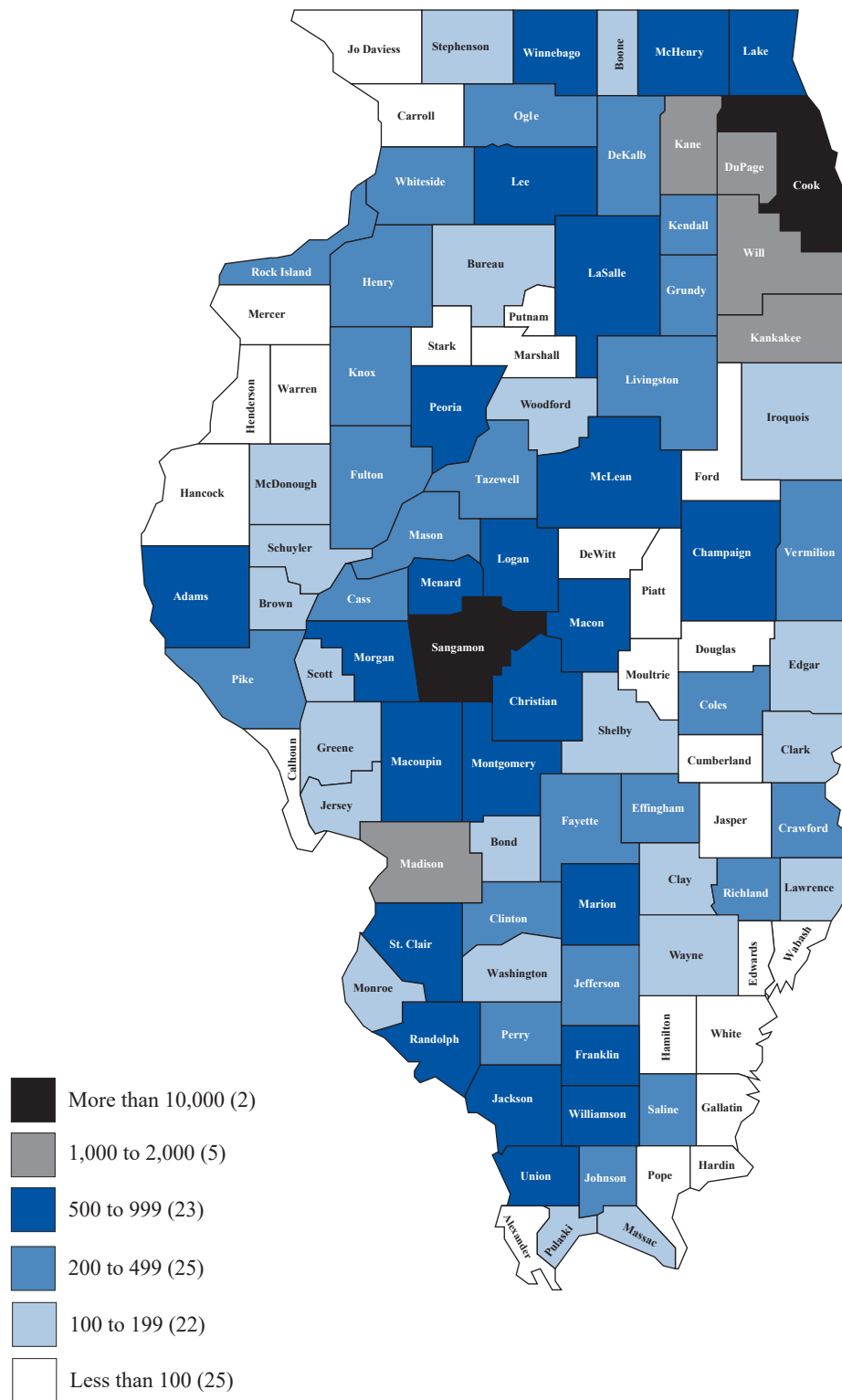
Map 1: Population Changes for Illinois Counties, 2010 to 2020

COMMISSION OVERVIEW

The Commission on Government Forecasting & Accountability is a bipartisan legislative support service agency responsible for advising the Illinois General Assembly on economic and fiscal policy issues and for providing objective policy research for legislators and legislative staffs. The Commission's board is comprised of twelve legislators—split evenly between the House and Senate and between Democrats and Republicans. Effective December 10, 2018, pursuant to P.A. 100-1148 the former Legislative Research Unit was merged into the Commission.

The Commission has three internal units—Revenue, Pensions, and Research, each of which has a staff of analysts and researchers who analyze policy proposals, legislation, state revenues & expenditures, and benefit programs, and who provide research services to members and staff of the General Assembly. The Commission's staff fulfills the statutory obligations set forth in the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability Act (25 ILCS 155/), the State Debt Impact Note Act (25 ILCS 65/), the Illinois Pension Code (40 ILCS 5/), the Pension Impact Note Act (25 ILCS 55/), the State Facilities Closure Act (30 ILCS 608/), the State Employees Group Insurance Act of 1971 (5 ILCS 375/), the Public Safety Employee Benefits Act (820 ILCS 320/), the Legislative Commission Reorganization Act of 1984 (25 ILCS 130/), and the Reports to the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability Act (25 ILCS 110/).

- The **Revenue Unit** issues an annual revenue estimate, reports monthly on the state's financial and economic condition, and prepares bill analyses and debt impact notes on legislation having a financial impact on the State. The Revenue Unit also provides caucus staffs with valuation analyses of proposals or funding scenarios being considered. The Unit publishes a number of statutorily mandated reports, as well as on-demand reports, including the *Monthly Briefing* newsletter and annually, the *Budget Summary*, *Capital Plan Analysis*, *Illinois Economic Forecast Report*, *Wagering in Illinois Update*, and *Liabilities of the State Employees' Group Insurance Program*, among others. The Unit's staff also fulfills the agency's obligations set forth in the State Facilities Closure Act.
- The **Pension Unit** prepares pension impact notes on proposed pension legislation and publishes several statutorily mandated reports including the *Financial Condition of the Illinois State Retirement Systems*, the *Financial Condition of Illinois Public Pension Systems* and the *Fiscal Analysis of the Downstate Police & Fire Pension Funds in Illinois*. The Unit's staff also fulfills the statutory responsibilities set forth in the Public Safety Employee Benefits Act.
- The **Research Unit** primarily performs research and provides information as may be requested by members of the General Assembly or legislative staffs. The Unit maintains a research library and, per statute, collects information concerning state government and the general welfare of the state, examines the effects of constitutional provisions and previously enacted statutes, considers public policy issues and questions of state-wide interest, and tracks appointments to State boards and commissions. Additionally, the Unit publishes *First Reading*, a quarterly newsletter, *Abstracts of State Reports*, a monthly bulletin which includes abstracts of annual reports or special studies from other state agencies, the *Illinois Tax Handbook for Legislators*, *Federal Funds to State Agencies*, various reports detailing appointments to State Boards and Commissions, the *1970 Illinois Constitution Annotated for Legislators*, the *Roster of Illinois Legislators*, and numerous special topic publications.

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
