

Delays regarding the staffing and prisoner transfer to the TCC resulted in corresponding delays of IDOC user charge payments to the point where the Village could default on its bond payments. On February 4, 2002, the Village executed the First Addendum to Intergovernmental Agreement for Purchase of Water and Sewer Service ("Addendum") which was signed by Donald Snyder, Jr., Director of the IDOC. The purpose of the Addendum was to defray the Village's principal and interest payments. The Village and the Department have executed additional Addenda annually, with the most recent Seventh Addendum dated August 3, 2009. The annual payments are based on the shortfall between user fees escrowed for bond payment and amount of bond payment, if any.

We are aware of the recommendation filed on November 25, 2009 by Director Randle to close the Thomson Correctional Center. While the Village Board of Trustees fully supports the sale of the TCC to the Federal Bureau of Prisons, we are concerned that if the TCC remains closed the Department will no longer appropriate funds to make these payments. Without the continued financial support from the Department, the Village will undoubtedly face default on the bond payments.

Please consider this issue when making your recommendation to the office of Governor Quinn.

Gentlemen:

I would like to thank Governor Quinn, Senator Durbin and all of our other federal and state elected officials who are supporting the proposed sale of the Thomson Correctional Center to the Federal Bureau of Prisons.

After living in limbo for eight years, we must finally begin utilizing this virtually vacant, state-of-the-art, maximum security prison. This is the right plan to make that happen.

Over the years we've held rallies and taken bus trips to Springfield. Our former Village President went to Washington DC trying to get the prison open. This fall we sent letters to Governor Quinn and seven other elected officials and told them we would be willing to consider any alternatives so that this facility could be fully utilized.

Our entire region is hurting. Businesses are closing, jobs are leaving and people are losing their homes. We know that the sale of this prison will affect our neighbors outside Carroll County on both sides of the River. We want our families to have opportunities close to home so that they won't have to look for jobs somewhere else. Fully opening the prison will have a huge positive impact on our local economy. Even though not all prison jobs can be filled by local residents, it will mean more jobs in construction and services. Our restaurants will be full and many of our businesses that close or reduce their operating hours during the winter may be able to stay open year round. The sale of this prison to the federal government will help that happen.

But I would never, ever chase jobs that would jeopardize the safety and security of my friends and neighbors. I've been extremely disappointed in some elected officials, including many who've probably never been to Carroll County, spreading misinformation and trying to scare people. This isn't about politics. This is about listening and responding to the will of the people you represent.

Law enforcement, economic development professionals, community leaders and elected officials from throughout the region have had in-depth meetings and discussions with the Federal Bureau of Prisons and Department of Defense about purchasing the Thomson Correctional Center. The top five security officials of the US government have assured President Obama that this prison will be beefed up to be more secure than the Supermax facility in Colorado.

We didn't make a snap decision. We listened, learned and asked a lot of tough questions about security and the federal officials we met with confirmed:

No detainees will be released in the U.S. because it's against federal law.

Detainees can't have any visitors except their lawyers or members of the International Red Cross.

This maximum security prison would be upgraded even further to make it America's most secure federal prison.

No inmate has ever escaped from a federal super maximum security prison.

We need to be safe. We need to give people hope. We need to give people opportunities to keep their families here. This is our shot to do all three.

I've been a referee for 35 years, and I always call them like I see them.


Frankly, I would have hoped to be able to respond to the "Band of Mothers" and the TEA Party naysayers.

agrees that there will be an economic benefit created by the new federal prison/detention facility in Thomson, although not everyone agrees as to the extent of that economic benefit.

There is far more fundamental issue at stake here: our commitment to winning the war against the terrorists who attacked our Country.

I understand that throughout the continental United States there are some 350 terrorists or enemy combatants imprisoned in federal or state prisons.

There are some 34 of them incarcerated in Illinois.

The fact is that we have taken enemy combatants captive and we hold them. We have prosecuted terrorists, tried and convicted them and we have imprisoned them.

We went to war against Al Quaeda in late 2001 after it attacked the United States.

Our president, George W. Bush, called all of us to war against Al Quaeda. And rightly so. President Bush warned us that:

- this war would not end quickly,
- it would take a long time to defeat our enemy,
- there would be sacrifices that we would have to make.

War necessarily entails casualties - our own as well as our enemy's. That simply means dead, wounded and captured enemy: the Al Quaeda and their allies, primarily the Taleban.

Many young men and women from Carroll, Whiteside, Lee, Ogle and the surrounding counties have served Our Country in this war. I suspect that every single person here can name one, probably more, soldiers who have served in this war. I have two sons who have served there. One son has had two combat tours, and his brother has had four combat tours in Afghanistan, and he will return early next year for his fifth.

Why is it that it's OK to go to war - to kill and capture our enemy - yet somehow not hold them prisoner in our own country?

Surely, the men that the United States wants to imprison and detain in the Thomson facility are not as dangerous as Richard Speck, John Wayne Geasy and many others who murdered, raped, and maimed right here in Illinois. I think not - but if you honestly do, ask yourself how many of them have escaped from our maximum and super max facilities.

When we are called upon to step up for our Country, as President Bush asked us to do, then step up - stand up - for our Country with the same bravery and courage and commitment that our young soldiers exhibited when we sent them off to Afghanistan and Iraq.

To do otherwise would be to admit to President Bush, to our Country and to ourselves, that we lack the courage and determination that President Bush saw in us.

Gentlemen:

I am writing to express my full and unreserved support for the sale of the Thomson Correctional Center to the Federal Bureau of Prisons. However, I also wish to express my concern for a smooth transition.

At the time the prison was constructed, I was a member of the Thomson Village Board and I chaired the Water and Sewer Committee. In that capacity, I was the principle negotiator for the Village with the DOC/State of Illinois. We designed a rate structure that would meet the needs of the DOC and not cause a hardship to the Village. I would like to think that this same principle will continue to be followed.

Since the AG determined that the Governor can sell the TCC and that the earliest date for completion would be in March of 2010; and since the Federal Bureau of Prisons has indicated that they wish to purchase the facility, I propose that the Federal Bureau of Prisons deposit into an escrow account with the Village of Thomson sufficient funds to pay the operating cost, maintenance, replacement and bonds for what would be the estimated share of the cost to the state of Illinois from January 1, 2010 through March 30, 2010; and at the completion of the sale, the Federal Bureau of Prisons be given credit against the purchase price for the actual cost for this period of time.

The goal here is to hold the Village of Thomson harmless through the transition period. It would ensure that the residents of Thomson are not left paying the cost of operations of a plant that far exceeds anything they need. It would ensure that bonds are paid in a timely fashion and that the physical plant is properly operated and maintained which is vital to all parties.

As you and State Representative Richard Myers convene the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, I write to express my strong support for the State's sale and the federal Bureau of Prison's purchase of the Thomson Correctional Center.

The Thomson Correctional Center – a state-of-the-art correctional facility – has been sitting virtually empty for more than eight years, costing the state at least \$2 million per year in maintenance. The Obama Administration has put forward a credible plan to acquire Thomson and make it the safest federal maximum security prison in America. As you know, it would also house a limited number of Guantanamo Bay detainees.

This initiative will have an overwhelmingly positive impact on the local economy – creating more than 3,400 jobs – half of which will be drawn from the local area – and injecting at least \$1 billion into the local economy. This is an opportunity to dramatically reduce unemployment, create thousands of good-paying jobs, and breathe new economic life into Northwestern Illinois.

After a number of briefings by State and federal officials, I believe that the plan put forward by the President would not jeopardize the safety and security of the region. I trust our local, state, and federal law enforcement officials; the military; and the intelligence community to evaluate any potential security threats and to safely incarcerate federal inmates and detainees.

I'm constantly amazed by the baseless accusations of the plan's opponents. This is in response to a November 20, 2009, letter received by the Secretary of Defense, regarding the U.S. Government's potential acquisition of the Thomson Correctional Center to house both federal inmates and a limited number of detainees from Guantanamo. As you know, officials from the Departments of Defense, Justice, and Homeland Security visited the facility in Thomson, Illinois, on November 16, 2009, and met with more than 120 local, State, and Federal officials to answer questions and exchange information. Our staff was uniformly impressed with the facility, its state-of-the-art security measures, and the people of Thomson and the surrounding area.

We welcome the opportunity to work with you and your colleagues as this process moves forward. As part of this effort, Members of the Illinois congressional delegation received a detailed briefing on December 2, 2009, from Defense Department and Justice Department officials. During that briefing, questions were posed by Members of both parties and both Houses of Congress that were similar to those in your letter of November 20. For this reason, the Departments of Defense and Justice have prepared written answers to more than 30 questions that I am forwarding to the entire Illinois delegation.

Finally, as Secretary Gates stated in his Senate testimony last week, during his service as Secretary of Defense for both President Bush and President Obama, his assessment has remained the same: Guantanamo bears a taint, and it is a recruiting tool for al Qaeda and for other terrorists and Islamic extremists. This assessment is shared by the nation's top military commanders who prosecuted this war under the previous administration and continue to do so today, including Admiral Michael Mullen, the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and General David Petraeus, the Commander of U.S. Central Command.

Working together, we can close Guantanamo in a responsible manner, and our men and women in uniform can safely and securely house a limited number of detainees within the United States. Thank you again for your consideration.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS FROM ILLINOIS MEMBERS

Topic A: Military Commissions, Civilian Trials, Prolonged Detention

1. Of detainees set to be transferred to Thomson, how many would be selected for trial by civilian court?

If Thomson is selected, we do not anticipate that any detainees currently at Guantanamo Bay who are transferred to Thomson would be prosecuted in civilian courts. Instead, detainees who will be prosecuted in Federal court would be transferred directly to the jurisdiction where they would be prosecuted. For example, the Attorney General, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense, announced on November 13, 2009, that five detainees accused of conspiring to commit the 9/11 attacks would be prosecuted in Federal court in New York. Those detainees will be transferred directly from Guantanamo Bay to the Southern District of New York, where they will be tried. If additional detainees are designated for prosecution in Federal courts, they also will be transferred directly from Guantanamo Bay to a suitable facility with commensurate security in the jurisdiction where they will be tried.

a. By what legal precedent will you be prosecuting enemy combatants in a civilian court?

Under the Constitution and laws of the United States, Federal courts have jurisdiction over a number of terrorism offenses. The Department of Justice has successfully and safely prosecuted terrorists in Federal courts for many years, including:

- Zacarias Moussaoui, convicted in connection with the 9/11 attacks;
- Ali al-Marri, convicted al Qaeda sleeper agent;
- Ramzi Youssef, convicted mastermind of 1993 World Trade Center bombing; and
- Omar Abdul Rahman, convicted in 1995 of conspiracy to target the United Nations building and other New York landmarks.

b. Without having been read Miranda rights, what are the chances enemy combatants could win release by entering civilian court?

Consistent with longstanding policy regarding criminal prosecutions, the Department of Justice will pursue prosecutions of Guantanamo Bay detainees in Federal court only when admissible evidence or potentially available admissible evidence will probably be sufficient to obtain and sustain a conviction. The Attorney General has made clear that he would not have decided to pursue prosecution of the accused 9/11 co-conspirators in Federal court if he did not believe prosecutors could secure a conviction. We cannot comment further on evidentiary issues that particular cases may present.

c. Where would these trials take place?

The trials of the accused 9/11 co-conspirators will take place in the Southern District of New York. If additional Guantanamo Bay detainees are prosecuted in Federal courts, their trials will take place in the Federal judicial districts with venue over the offenses.

d. Where would such detainees be housed during the trial?

The accused 9/11 co-conspirators will be housed during trial in secure detention facilities in the Southern District of New York. If additional Guantanamo Bay detainees are prosecuted in Federal courts, they will be housed in secure facilities in the Federal judicial districts with venue over the offenses.

e. What steps will be needed to ensure the security of prosecutors, judges, juries and their families?

Subject matter experts with the U.S. Marshals Service (USMS) have extensive experience in risk management, protective investigations, and protective response. The Bureau of Prisons (BOP) and USMS also have extensive experience housing terrorism defendants both during trial and after conviction. They intend to work closely with state and local authorities to protect against any threats to the trials or detention facilities where terrorism defendants are held, or to the surrounding communities. Potential security measures for judges, prosecutors, jurors, and their families, if necessary, will be determined on a case-by-case basis pursuant to a continuous risk analysis conducted by USMS, which has conducted thousands of protective details and investigates over 1,300 potential threats every year.

2. Of detainees set to be transferred to Thomson, how many would be selected for trial by military commission?

The Administration intends to use all instruments of national power to defeat terrorist extremists, including both Federal courts and military commissions. On November 13, 2009, the same day the Attorney General decided, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense, that the alleged 9/11 coconspirators would be prosecuted in Federal court, he also decided that the cases of five other Guantanamo Bay detainees could be prosecuted by military commissions, including the detainee accused of orchestrating the bombing of the USS COLE. The Attorney General will continue to review additional cases that are referred to the protocol process, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense, and announce further forum decisions on a rolling basis.

a. Where would these commissions take place?

Although a final decision has not yet been made on where reformed military commissions will take place, one option under consideration is to hold military commissions at the detention facility selected for detention. If Thomson is that facility, it has existing space that could be used to try military commission cases as well as significant administrative space and other amenities that could provide support to military commissions.

b. Where would such detainees be housed during the trial?

Detainees prosecuted in reformed military commissions would be held at the same location where they are being tried. If the Thomson facility is selected for such detainees, they would be held securely before, during, and after trial within the facility.

c. What steps will be needed to ensure the security of the prosecutors, judges, and their families?

The Thomson detention facility was constructed in 2001 to maximum security specifications. In addition, after Defense Department upgrades to the perimeter security, the Thomson facility would be as secure as any detention facility in the United States, including the "Supermax" prison in Florence, Colorado. Specific procedures to protect the security of participants in the military commission process would be similar to those already in place at Guantanamo. Military court members would not be identified publicly; counsel, judges, and court staff would be briefed on force protection measures; and any perceived threats would be handled by appropriate Defense Department security personnel. Consistent with the policies currently in place at Guantanamo, personnel would be billeted in undisclosed locations, and all observers would be fully screened before being admitted to the courtroom viewing area. Guards and a quick reaction team would be on-call in case of any disruption within the courtroom.

3. Of detainees set to be transferred to Thomson, how many fall into President Obama's fifth category—those too dangerous for trial or release?

The President never designated a category of detainees who are "too dangerous for trial" or "so dangerous that they can never be prosecuted." During his speech at the National Archives on May 21, 2009, the President stated that "there may be a number of people who cannot be prosecuted for past crimes, in some cases because evidence may be tainted, but who nonetheless pose a threat to the security of the United States." With respect to these cases, the President also stated:

"[W]e must recognize that these detention policies cannot be unbounded. They can't be based simply on what I or the executive branch decide alone. That's why my administration has begun to reshape the standards that apply to ensure that they are in line with the rule of law. We must have clear, defensible, and lawful standards for those who fall into this category. We must have fair procedures so that we don't make mistakes. We must have a thorough process of periodic review, so that any prolonged detention is carefully evaluated and justified."

For these reasons, any detainees at Guantanamo who continue to be held, and for whom no prosecution is planned, will be held only under authority granted by Congress in 2001 under the Authorization for Use of Military Force, as informed by the law of war. In addition, the Supreme Court ruled in *Boumediene v. Bush*, 128 S. Ct. 2229 (2008), that all detainees currently held at Guantanamo have the right to file petitions for habeas corpus to challenge their detention in Federal court. Detainees will continue to have that right when they are transferred to the United States.

With respect to the number of detainees who will continue to be held, and for whom no prosecution is planned, an interagency review panel has been working since February to review the status of every detainee currently being held at Guantanamo. This panel includes senior officials from the Departments of Justice, Defense, State, and Homeland Security, and the Office of the Director of

National Intelligence and the Office of the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Staffed by a task force of more than 60 career prosecutors, attorneys, and analysts from across the Federal Government, the panel has completed a preliminary examination of all detainees at Guantanamo and plans to make final detainee disposition decisions early next year.

Topic B: Legal Issues—Authorization for Detention on U.S. Soil

1. How many detainees who fall into the status of "too dangerous for trial or release" would be brought to Thomson, Illinois?

As stated above, there is no category of detainees who are "too dangerous for trial or release." Nevertheless, an interagency review panel is in the final stages of determining the number of detainees who will continue to be held, and for whom no prosecution is planned, under the authority granted by Congress in 2001.

2. Will the Administration agree to pass legislation authorizing the permanent detention without trial of such enemy combatants as the President pledged in his May 21st, speech?

Congress has already enacted legislation authorizing detention in the current conflict. The Authorization for Use of Military Force, which Congress enacted in September 2001, provides:

"[T]he President is authorized to use all necessary and appropriate force against those nations, organizations, or persons he determines planned, authorized, committed, or aided the terrorist attacks that occurred on September 11, 2001, or harbored such organizations or persons, in order to prevent any future acts of international terrorism against the United States by such nations, organizations or persons."

The Supreme Court's plurality opinion in *Hamdi v. Rumsfeld*, 542 U.S. 507 (2004), concluded that "Congress has clearly and unmistakably authorized detention" of individuals covered by this legislation. Federal courts are actively reviewing the Government's detention decisions in the context of habeas corpus challenges brought by detainees at Guantanamo.

3. If Congress does not pass such legislation and detainees are brought to Thomson, how will you prevent the detainee's legal representation from mounting a strong case for release by a court?

As stated above, the Supreme Court in *Hamdi v. Rumsfeld* concluded that the detention of individuals covered by the Authorization for Use of Military Force was authorized by Congress in 2001. In addition, the Supreme Court ruled in *Boumediene v. Bush*, 128 S. Ct. 2229 (2008), that all detainees currently held at Guantanamo have the right to file petitions for habeas corpus to challenge their detention in federal court. Detainees will continue to have that right when they are transferred to the United States.

Topic C: Legal Issues-Political Asylum and Consular Visits

1. Have you received a written opinion by the Justice Department that detainees lack legal grounds to apply for political asylum under federal law?

No. However, Section 552(f) of the Fiscal Year 2010 Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act, which was signed into law by the President on October 28, 2009, specifically bars immigration benefits for detainees including "classification as a refugee or applicant for asylum." See Pub. L. No. 111-83, § 552(d) (2009).

2. Have you received written legal opinions from the Justice Department that you will be able to deny a request by a foreign government to provide consular services to detainees?

The Department of Justice has not written a legal opinion on this topic during this administration and is not aware of any opinions written by the previous administration. Consular access has not been provided to detainees at Guantanamo Bay.

3. Should consular access be granted, what steps will be taken to prevent communication or coordination with outside actors?

Although consular access has not been provided to detainees at Guantanamo Bay, foreign government officials have met with some of their citizens at Guantanamo Bay following a determination by the U.S. Government that such access was appropriate and consistent with maintaining security.

Topic D: Protection for Detention Personnel

1. What steps will be taken to avoid the identity release of civilian or military detention personnel at the facility?

If the Thomson facility is selected, detainees transferred from Guantanamo would continue to be guarded by U.S. military personnel, just as they are now at Guantanamo. The Defense Department would operate its portion of the facility independently, and there would be no opportunity for detainees from Guantanamo to interact with Federal prison inmates.

As with all Defense Department facilities, including Guantanamo, the on-site commander is responsible for ensuring the security of the facility and its personnel. The on-site commander would have authority to take steps to avoid the public release of the identities of civilian or military personnel working at the facility. The on-site commander could take additional security measures if necessary, including allowing travel to the facility in civilian clothes, removing indications of military affiliation from automobiles, and "sanitizing" military uniforms when in proximity to detainees.

2. What steps will be taken to provide security for said detention personnel their families, and their communities?

As stated above, the on-site commander will have the tools necessary to ensure the security of the facility and its personnel, just as he currently does at Guantanamo. In addition to the specific

security measures outlined above, Defense Department personnel are trained in the mitigation of force protection concerns when off post. This is an annual training requirement, and the family members of Defense Department personnel are authorized and encouraged to receive this training as well.

Topic E: Medical Treatment and Associated Risks

1. Does the Thomson Correctional Facility currently house the required class three medical facilities for detainees?

Guantanamo does not have a Class 3 medical facility, but a Class 2 medical facility, supplemented with Memoranda of Understanding with physicians and other medical personnel who travel to the site. The same policy would apply if the Thomson facility is selected. The existing facility at Thomson already has a fully functional health unit that includes the following in-house components:

- emergency triage;
- medical records;
- pharmacy;
- radiology;
- physical therapy;
- negative pressure rooms; and
- 16-bed infirmary with two crisis care rooms.

The Defense Department would further upgrade the existing health unit to handle all foreseeable detained health conditions, just as it has done at Guantanamo for the past seven years.

2. If not, how long will it take to build?

As stated above, the existing facility at Thomson already includes a fully functional health unit. The Defense Department estimates that all upgrades to the existing health unit could be completed in a matter of months, and all upgrades would be completed prior to the arrival of detainees. If for some reason a detainee suffers from a health condition that cannot be treated fully within this upgraded facility, he would not be taken to a civilian medical facility, but would be transferred to a U.S. military base with secure medical facilities.

3. In the interim construction period, will detainees be treated at Mercy Medical Center in Clinton (9 miles), Morrison Community Hospital in Morrison (13 miles), CGH Medical Center in Sterling (21 miles) or another location?

No. As stated above, the Defense Department would not transfer any detainees from Guantanamo until all necessary medical upgrades are complete, and we do not foresee any circumstances in which detainees would be brought to civilian medical facilities.

4. What security measures will be needed to secure the detainee transport to and from the medical facility?

As stated above, the Defense Department would not transfer any detainees from Guantanamo until all necessary medical upgrades are complete, and we do not foresee any circumstances in which detainees would be brought to civilian medical facilities.

5. What security measures will be needed at the medical facility?

As stated above, the Defense Department would not transfer any detainees from Guantanamo until all necessary medical upgrades are complete, and we do not foresee any circumstances in which detainees would be brought to civilian medical facilities.

Topic F: Protesters and Emergency Responder Capacity

1. How many protesters are expected to come to Thomson from around the country and world?

Federal agencies have not attempted to estimate the number of protesters that might come to Thomson from around the country and around the world, and it is unlikely that any such estimate would be credible.

Nevertheless, if the Thomson facility is selected, Federal agencies including the Departments of Justice, Defense, and Homeland Security, would work with State and local agencies to identify and mitigate any threats relating to the population of Federal inmates and detainees at Thomson. The Federal Government's preliminary evaluation process already has included meetings and briefings with:

- Jonathon Monken, Director of Illinois State Police;
- Michael P. Randle, Director of Illinois Department of Corrections;
- Andrew Velasquez, Director of Illinois Emergency Management Agency; and
- Multiple regional, county, and local law enforcement officials.

In addition to potentially modifying existing Memoranda of Agreement (MOAs), local, State, and Federal agencies are evaluating intelligence-sharing capabilities through the Illinois state "fusion center" and the Federal Joint Terrorism Task Force.

2. Does Thomson currently have adequate police and public safety officers to handle crowd control and make arrests, if necessary?

Since the Thomson facility has not been fully utilized for the past eight years, it is likely that an increase in police and public safety officers will be necessary regardless of whether the thousands of new occupants at the facility are Federal inmates or detainees from Guantanamo. Federal officials and their counterparts in Illinois have begun the process of identifying additional personnel, resources, and authorities that may assist in handling the increased presence of both inmates and detainees at Thomson.

On December 2, 2009, Illinois law enforcement organizations, including the State Police, the Association of Chiefs of Police, the Sheriff's Association, and the Law Enforcement Alarm System, sent a letter to the Department of Defense and the Department of Justice endorsing the Thomson

facility as an option for housing federal inmates and a limited number of detainees from Guantanamo. Their letter stated:

"We should also work with the federal government to further explore and detail law enforcement's recommendations at the local, county and state levels in order to obtain the necessary additional resources, including manpower, equipment and funding. Given that support, we strongly believe that the operation of this facility can be conducted without any increased risk to public safety."

3. Does Thomson have sufficient jail capacity to house a significant number of law breakers?

As stated above, the Federal Government's preliminary evaluation process already has included meetings with local, State, and Federal law enforcement officials who are evaluating additional personnel, resources, and authorities that may assist in handling the increased presence of both inmates and detainees at Thomson. This would include the question of jail capacity for law breakers.

Topic G: Military Housing and Education Costs

1. Will these military homes be subject to local property tax?

Yes, if military personnel buy houses on the local economy around Thomson, they would be subject to the same property taxes as civilians in the area.

2. How many children may reasonably be expected to accompany 1,500 service members?

If Thomson is selected, the Defense Department estimates that between 1,000 and 1,500 personnel would move to the region. Approximately two-thirds of these employees would be military service members, while approximately one-third would be contractors and civilian personnel. Current Defense Department planning assumptions are that military service members would not bring family members to the region during the first year of the facility's operation. As a result, local school districts would have some time to prepare for the increased demand at local schools, including hiring new teachers. In the second year, the Defense Department would evaluate allowing service members to bring family members into the region.

3. Does West Carroll District #314 have the capacity to absorb all new military family students?

By itself, West Carroll District #314 is unlikely to have the capacity to absorb all new military family students. However, it will not be required to do so. The Council on Economic Advisers estimates that service members will settle in several counties within a one-hour drive. These include Carroll County, Whiteside County, Jo Daviess County, Lee County, and Rock Island County in Illinois, as well as Clinton County and Jackson County in Iowa. In addition, as stated above, the arrival of new military family students would not occur during the first year of the

facility's operation, so school districts in these counties would have some time to adjust to the increased demand.

4. Will West Carroll District #314 receive federal Impact Aid payments to subsidize these new education costs? Is so, how much per student?

If the Thomson facility is selected, Federal agencies would work with local, county, and state officials to identify multiple funding sources that may be available to assist with the increased Federal footprint in the region. Under the Impact Aid program, "basic support payments" help local school districts that educate "federally connected" children, including children of members of the uniformed services and children whose parents work on federal property. In general, to be eligible for assistance, a local school district must educate an average of at least 400 such children, or federally connected children must make up at least 3% of a school district's total average daily attendance. "Heavily impacted districts" that enroll certain percentages of federally connected children and meet other specific statutory criteria may receive increased formula payments.

I am writing to express my strong support for selling Thomson Prison to the Bureau of Prisons and moving detainees from Guantanamo Bay to the Thomson facility. Opponents of selling Thomson are presenting a false choice between economic prosperity and national security when in fact this proposal strengthens both.

Security has to be the first consideration in this decision. After being briefed by the National Security Council I am convinced that moving a limited number of detainees from Guantanamo Bay to Thomson would pose no security threat to the State of Illinois. Let's get the facts straight. No one in history has ever broken out of a Supermax prison, and Thomson would be equipped by the Department of Defense to exceed Supermax security measures. In addition, no Guantanamo detainee can be released on U.S. soil. If they are tried and convicted, they will be sentenced. If, in the unlikely event they are found not guilty, they will be deported. Friends and relatives of detainees would not be permitted to visit; only legal counsel and Red Cross monitors would.

Not only is this proposal good for our national security, it would create between 2,340 and 3,250 jobs and inject nearly a billion dollars into the local economy. Unemployment in Carroll County, where Thomson is located, would be cut in half. Unemployment would also drop in surrounding counties, including Rock Island and Whiteside, which I represent. This is a historic opportunity for our region that cannot and should not be derailed by the politics of fear.

WHEREAS, safety and security always has been and always will be our nation's top priority; and

WHEREAS, the Thomson Correctional Center is a state-of-the-art, maximum-security prison owned by the State of Illinois, and has been virtually vacant for the past eight years; and

WHEREAS, the federal Bureau of Prisons has recently toured the facility with U.S. Senator Dick Durbin and other Members of the Illinois and Iowa Congressional Delegations and is considering buying the maximum-security facility from the State of Illinois and leasing a small portion to the Department of Defense to house a limited number of detainees; and

WHEREAS, the federal Bureau of Prisons has said it would operate Thomson with its most restrictive conditions, additional security measures would be added to make it the most secure federal prison in the United States, and that no visitation rights would be afforded to federal detainees with the exception of their U.S.-appointed legal representation; and

WHEREAS, the Thomson Correctional Center, located in Carroll County, is within the jurisdiction of the U.S. District Court, Northern District of Illinois, Western Division, which is headquartered in the City of Rockford, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, President Obama and his Administration have clearly stated that federal detainees will not be involved in court proceedings, hearings, or tribunals within the Northern District of Illinois, Western Division District Court; and

WHEREAS, in the event that federal policy changes to allow court proceedings, hearings, or tribunals within the Northern District of Illinois, Western Division District Court, that the City of Rockford has the assurance from the U.S. Federal Government that all federal resources would be made available to ensure and provide for the safety and security of the citizens of Rockford, Winnebago County, and the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, if in the future a detainee is tried, convicted, and serves his/her time, the federal government has given assurances that under no circumstance would a detainee be released on U.S. soil, but rather the sentence would mandate deportation upon release; and







The Jo-Carroll Depot Local Redevelopment Authority supports the acquisition of the Thomson Correctional Center by the Bureau of Prisons and the lease of the prison to the Department of Defense to house detainees.

The acquisition would bring federal funding full circle. The prison was proposed for construction at the Savanna Army Depot by then-Gov. Jim Edgar in April 1998 to replace jobs lost when the base closed. The base was selected for closure in 1995 when the installation employed approximately 425 people, down from the more than 7,000 during WWII.

Gov. Edgar reassigned the prison to Thomson in July 1998. The depot closed in March 2000.. The opportunity to fully utilize this prison and again have a substantial influx of federal funds into the region's economy--an estimated \$790 million to \$1.09 billion over the first four years—is a must for the region affected by the base closure.

There were risks associated when the then-open Depot was the nation's largest ordnance depot, when it housed a unit of Italian POWs during WWII and when it was used to store nuclear weapons in the 1960s and 1970s. The region was willing, and for the most part, proud to support the national security/war efforts then. It would be proud to join forces with the Bureau of Prisons and Department of Defense to assure national security today. It is proud to have a US Senator and a Governor who understand the economic needs of this region and are willing to implement a plan to help meet the needs of people in this state and nation. December 22, 2009 Hearing on the Closure of the Thomson Correctional Center Held by the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability <u>Testimony</u>

My name is Diane M. Komiskey. I am the executive director of the Jo-Carroll Depot Local Redevelopment Authority, the "LRA." The eight-man LRA Board was created by Jo Daviess and Carroll counties. The LRA is the federally recognized agency with the authority to receive from the Army nearly 3,000 acres now known as the Savanna Depot Park at the former 13,062-acre Savanna Army Depot. The LRA is responsible for overseeing and implementing reuse of the Savanna Depot Park for economic development purposes.

The Savanna Depot Park is in a rural area of the two counties, 20 miles north of the Thomson Correctional Center. At its peak during WWII, the Depot employed 7,195 workers. In the 1950s, it was the largest ordnance depot in the nation. From 1961-1975, it housed nuclear weapons. Workers handled, processed, and stored munitions, explosives and industrial chemicals. They loaded artillery shells, conventional and special lightweight bombs and renovated, demolished and disposed of munitions components. Conservatively, 250 students per year from the U.S. and foreign countries received technical training at the Depot.

Were risks associated with work at the Depot on behalf of the nation's defense? Absolutely. Were the people of northwest Illinois afraid to take those risks? Absolutely not. The soldiers and civilians I've met speak with overwhelming pride in having contributed at the Savanna Army Depot to national security.

The Depot's mission ended March 18, 2000. Why? In 1995, the Base Realignment and Closure Commission selected the Savanna Army Depot Activity for closure. The Depot then provided 423 jobs and had an annual payroll of \$16 million. The direct and indirect economic activity was estimated at \$35.5 million annually.

Ideas blossomed for reusing the Depot. The LRA sought an anchor tenant to spur redevelopment.

Then-Governor Jim Edgar in April 1998 chose the Depot as the site for a maximum security prison. The 450 state employees were to replace the federal jobs lost when the base closed. However, in late July 1998, the Governor bowed to pressure to construct the prison at Thomson.

Since then, disappointment has followed disappointment. In the absence of the prison as an anchor tenant, reuse of the installation has been hindered by the pace of environmental cleanup, challenged by the Depot's rural location and impeded by bureaucracy. An enterprise zone, foreign trade zone and HUBZone help. The existence of a shortline railroad and spur on the BNSF Railway are significant.

Today, nearly 15 years after it was selected for closure and nearly 10 years after it closed, with more than 80 percent of the property under contract, only 35 percent of the 3,000 acres have been conveyed to the LRA so it can sell that property at below-market rates to stimulate economic development. In November, 55 full-time jobs were held at the Depot.

The Thomson Correctional Center has been a good neighbor to the LRA. Minimum-security unit work crews have helped maintain and improve property marketed by the LRA in the Savanna Depot Park. It would have been wonderful if that relationship could have continued.

It would have been wonderful if AFSCME had joined northwest Illinois residents and their friend in Springfield, Rep. Jim Sacia, in our attempts to fully open the Thomson prison years ago. It would be wonderful if the state could afford to fully operate the prison and state jobs would be available for the good people who counted on them.

It would be wonderful if Illinois was not facing what The Pew Center on the States said is "among the worst budget gaps in the country." It would be wonderful if the State could count on growing its way out of this budget shortfall with increased revenues from corporate income tax revenues.

This is the season of wonders, but reality plays Scrooge. Your November briefing substantiates what we who work in economic development in northwest Illinois know. Illinois businesses are struggling. Attracting new ones is challenging, especially in northwest Illinois with business

friendly Iowa nearby.


It would be wonderful if the General Assembly would make the state more attractive to businesses. If that happened today, it nevertheless would take years to fill the budget hole.

Illinois cannot afford to turn down the incredible opportunity being offered by President Obama. Whether the prison employs current residents or attracts younger people to the region, it's a plus for northwest Illinois. Whether 100, 300 or 3,000 federal jobs are created by the Bureau of Prisons at Thomson, it's a plus for northwest Illinois. Whether the Department of Defense has 500, 1,000 or 1,500 people assigned to northwest Illinois for detainee-related work, it's a plus for northwest Illinois.

Please, do as the LRA said in letters of support and a resolution: Sell the Thomson Correctional Center to the Bureau of Prisons. Open the door for the Department of Defense to lease a portion of the prison. Return to northwest Illinois the flow of federal funds that left the region with the closing of the Savanna Army Depot.



Prepared Remarks of Michael W. Hastings
President and CEO, Jo-Carroll Energy
Chairman, Tri-County Economic Development Alliance

Distinguished commission members, my name is Michael Hastings, and I am the president and CEO of Jo-Carroll Energy, a not-for-profit electric and natural gas cooperative serving Carroll, Jo Daviess and Whiteside counties. I'm also the chairman of TCEDA, the Tri-County Economic Development Alliance, a private, not-for-profit agency supporting economic development in the same three-county area.

I am here today on behalf of Jo-Carroll Energy's board of directors and the 18,000 member-owners we serve – and the 23 government agencies and thousands of businesses represented by TCEDA – to relay to you a clear, unified, and unequivocal message: We support this project.

For more than 20 years, the population of our region has steadily declined. Businesses have closed. Our young people have moved away for lack of any opportunity. We were forced to sit by and watch the closing of the Savanna Army Depot – a facility that once employed thousands of people. And while the rest of the nation has gotten a bitter taste of double-digit unemployment during the current recession, Carroll County has endured that pain for many years. And for the few jobs we do have, median incomes are among the lowest in the nation.

More than a decade ago we rejoiced when the state selected Thomson as the site for its new maximum security prison. We improved and expanded schools, utility systems and businesses to prepare for its arrival. And for the past eight-plus years we have waited and hoped that the state would some day put the Thomson Correctional Center to good use. Several opportunities to do that have come and gone. Opportunities that would have reduced overcrowding and security issues at other facilities in the state.

But while the state of Illinois pays to maintain a facility it barely uses, the federal government spends millions to operate a detention facility on foreign soil.

Given that set of circumstances, the sale, transfer and redevelopment of the Thomson prison as a facility for federal inmates and GITMO detainees is a logical way for everybody involved to come out a winner.

That's not a partisan statement, and this shouldn't be a partisan issue. During the last election, both John McCain and Barack Obama said GITMO needed to close. State and local officials in our region from both sides of the aisle have strongly endorsed this plan. They see this proposal for what it is: a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for economic development and job creation in northwest Illinois.

Understandably, a project like this demands thoughtful consideration of safety and security issues. Based on what I have seen so far, it sounds like Carroll County might end up being one of the safest and most secure places in America.

To those who say we're trading security for a payday, I ask you to remember who we built this facility to house. Thomson is a state-of-the art maximum security prison. Its guests were supposed to be the worst of the worst in the state. Violent criminals who have perpetrated deplorable, unspeakable acts against our people.

I have unwavering faith in the brave men and women of our military and law enforcement agencies who have courageously protected our nation since 9/11, and who will continue to keep us safe when this facility opens.

While my family sleeps soundly every night under the blanket of safety they provide, there's another security concern that does keep me up at night – the economic security of our region. By now you've heard all the statistics in the White House report - 3,000-plus jobs and a billion dollars in new economic activity over the first four years.

In an era where large numbers get thrown around casually, it's easy to lose sight of what those statistics really mean. As CEO of a locally-owned utility, I see first hand every day the hardships of the people of northwest Illinois. Honest, hard-working folks who live paycheck to paycheck and struggle to pay their bills and keep their homes warm.

These are the people you should worry about when making this choice. You have a chance to improve their lives immeasurably. To put them to work – not just at the prison, but at all the businesses that will expand or open to serve the new neighbors who will move to our region.

While the Thomson facility is severely under-utilized, we know there are some Department of Corrections employees who will be affected by this plan. They are our friends, neighbors and relatives, and we will not let them be put out of work. The federal acquisition would present new and different guard and administrative opportunities at the Thomson facility. And local growth as a result of the acquisition would present numerous law enforcement, administrative and security opportunities throughout the region — many perhaps better than those at Thomson today.

Terrorists want us to live in terror. They prey on one of our most basic of instincts – fear – to manipulate us into doing things we would not otherwise do. We built a prison in Thomson to house evil people. Today we have a chance to put that facility to good use while creating new jobs and sending a strong message in the war on terror. We can't let fear triumph over common sense. If we do, the terrorists get exactly what they want.

On behalf of Jo-Carroll Energy, the Tri-County Economic Development Alliance, and the thousands of honest, hard-working folks they represent, I urge you to let logic rule the day. Invest in Northwest Illinois, and put our prison to work serving our country and strengthening our region. Thank you for your time.



Dear Senator Schoenberg and Representative Meyers,

Governor Quinn's proposed sale of Thomson Correctional Center is a matter of great concern to the Illinois State Employees Association (ISEA), Laborers' Local 2002 and our members. As Supervisory employees working for the Department of Corrections they are charged with responsibility for overseeing the operation of Thomson Correctional Center and other facilities throughout the State. They understand and experience daily, how the lack of funding and prison overcrowding impacts the operation of these institutions.

It is on behalf of these employees that we urge the commission <u>not</u> to support closure of the Thomson Correctional Center. Thomson Correctional Center was funded and built when members of the Legislature recognized the dangerous situation which had developed due to the severe overcrowding and the antiquated physical plant of our existing maximum security prisons. Recent news reports regarding the needed early release of 1000 inmates, the "PUSH" program releasing 850 additional inmates onto the streets and proposals to close Jesse "Ma" Houston ATC and eliminate 1500 maximum security beds at Stateville Correctional Center all support the continued need for additional modern, "maximum security" bed space like that at Thomson.

While lack of funding during these tough economic times is a reality, so too, are the issues of overcrowding and the deterioration of our existing prisons. If Thomson is sold, it will be only a matter of time before the State of Illinois must again confront the challenge of adding additional and more costly prison bed space. The sale of the Thomson facility will only make matters worse and further delay the Department of Corrections' ability to confront and correct *in an appropriate manner*, the problems of dangerously overcrowded prisons.

Additionally, I would like to address some statements provided at the hearing in Sterling, IL on 12-22-09 which I believe was misleading.

• First, having inmates classified as "maximum security" double celled, is <u>not</u> a desired inmate living arrangement. To the contrary, such arrangements often



violate Correctional Association standards and are necessary only because of the lack of available space to single cell the inmates. As a retired Corrections Administrator/Chief of Security of 25 years, I can attest that there is no therapeutic, operational or inmate programming benefit to having two maximum security inmates in a cell together. Unfortunately, the chronic overcrowding Corrections has experienced over the years may now be considered "normal" but is not preferred or desirable.

• Secondly, Illinois prisons are overcrowded. Carefully crafted references to available "bed space" when discussing the overcrowding did not accurately describe the situation. The prisons were designed and built to hold a specific number of inmates. We now exceed that design capacity by approximately 40% throughout all security levels and by 65-70%, in the maximum security facilities. Simply buying and placing additional beds is not a satisfactory solution to overcrowding. The filling of every available inch of floor space and double or triple bunking beds are stop gap measures at best and should never be considered permanent, acceptable solutions to overcrowding.

I respectfully request you consider the above as written testimony and enter it as part of the record regarding the proposed closure of Thomson Correctional Center.

Dear Chairman Schoenberg:

As you prepare to vote on the recommendation by the Illinois Department of Corrections to close the Thomson Correctional Center, I ask that you give serious consideration to the far-reaching state, national and international security implications of the proposed use of this facility for housing terrorist detainees that are currently being held at the U.S. Naval facility in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

While the Illinois Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability traditionally has focused its attention on economic matters directly impacting the State of Illinois, your consideration of this issue presents a critical and unique opportunity for the people of Illinois, through their elected legislators, to exercise their voice over a decision that carries with it enormous consequences for the country as a whole.

This Christmas, Americans were reminded of the ongoing threat that we face from terrorist factions overseas whose goal is death and destruction to America and all things American. While, as a nation, we breathed a collective sigh of relief that the attempted airline bombing on December 25th did not end in greater tragedy, the incident shined a stark spotlight on potential gaps in America's security apparatus. It also has raised many additional unanswered questions regarding the Administration's broader plans. including those related to the Thomson facility, for dealing with foreign enemy combatant detainees.

As you may know, the attempted bomber of Northwest Airlines Flight 253 was reportedly trained by Al Qaeda operatives in a terrorist camp located in Yemen. Al Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula (AQAP) has since claimed responsibility for the attack and includes among its ranks terrorist leaders like Said Ali Shiri, a former Guantanamo Bay detainee. Just this week, the U.S. Embassy in Yemen was forced to suspend operations entirely due to likelihood of imminent terrorist activity. In light of these facts, the Administration yesterday was forced to reconsider the transfer of Guantanamo Bay detainees to Yemen, where the effectiveness of long-term detainment has been called into serious question.

As the Administration's plans change with the international and political climate, the number, nature, and status of those detainees that may be brought to Illinois remains an open question with no answer in sight before the future of the Thomson facility is to be decided. And, unfortunately, this is not an isolated example of where the Administration has failed to address the serious questions from Congress, Illinois leaders, and others regarding how it intends to deal with the immense security, legal, and logistical considerations of closing the detention facility at Guantanamo Bay. Congress does not have access to detailed backgrounds of the individual detainees who would be brought to Illinois; the Administration has not stated how it intends to deal with detainees should the courts find fault with the government's use of authority; and no full risk assessment has been presented to the people of Illinois regarding the potential, added terrorist threat resulting from the government's decision to make Illinois home to the next Guantanamo Bay.

As a federal legislator and former attorney, I especially question how bringing these detainees onto American soil and granting some the full rights and privileges of a civilian trial will improve the security and safety of 300 million Americans. The Administration has put itself in a very tenuous position by opting to cherry-pick which detainees should be tried in federal court, which should be tried by military commissions, and which should continue to be held without trial. Instead, we should try all detainees before military commissions, ensuring due process, equal justice, and national security. Military commissions are constitutional and well established in American and Western jurisprudence. Furthermore, these trials should be held away from civilian population centers where they could become focus points for disruption and create unnecessary security hazards for area residents. At present, the most appropriate location to carry out these trials continues to be to be at our military facility in Cuba—out of our civilian courts and away from our heartland.

In light of recent terrorist activity, the President has announced his intention to quickly review and respond to potential gaps in our air travel and homeland security procedures and capabilities, and I know I join many of my colleagues in Congress who stand fully prepared to work with the Administration to harden our defenses against future terrorist threats. However, the Administration has yet to offer any indication that it will suspend or reverse its misguided decision to close the Guantanamo Bay facility as we reevaluate our relationships overseas, consider options for strengthening our security, and improve the intelligence operations that inform these important decisions.

These plans should go hand-in-hand as part of a cohesive national strategy that will prevent the kind of attack on American soil that took the lives of 3,000 innocent Americans on September 11th, 2001. And while some would like to dismiss the legitimate questions and policy considerations surrounding the closure of Guantanamo Bay as little more than "fear mongering," the fact remains that the world is a dangerous place and we should not take such major actions without considering the threats we currently face around the globe. Others claim that closing the base at Guantanamo Bay would remove a key recruiting tool from terrorist organizations, but the same argument holds little weight when the chosen alternative is to simply relocate the object of terrorist propaganda to American soil. Indeed, this logic only serves to highlight how this new detention facility could become a draw for terrorist threats.

I ask that you, as members of the Illinois Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, consider the decision you will make on this matter not solely as a budgetary item, but as an opportunity to show that, in Illinois, we put the security of our families first, and we expect our leaders in Washington to do the same. Please send a clear message to our Governor and the Administration that if they continue to push this plan on Illinois, they will be doing so without the consent of the people who will bear the greatest burden for their mistakes.

Dear Senator Schoenberg and Representative Meyers:

Governor Quinn has announced his intention to close Thomson Correctional Center. While this closure request has drawn more than the usual media and political attention, we trust you will uphold the letter and spirit of the law in reviewing this closure.

As you know, members of our union have been impacted by several closure requests in recent years. In several instances, the Commission has, through the process laid out in law, played an invaluable role in shedding light on public concerns. We hope that same high standard you have applied in the past to ensure that all sides are heard will apply equally in the instant case.

We were concerned to read that Senator Schoenberg is considering asking the Commission members to vote on the Thomson closure at the public hearing scheduled on Dec. 22, 2009. We hope you will consider the statutory requirements and refrain from taking such a vote at that time.

Note that the Act lays out the following absolute timelines:

- 30 ILCS 608/5-10 (b) "If a recommendation is required by the Commission, a 30-day public comment period must follow the filing of the recommendation."
- 30 ILCS 608/5-10 (c) "Within 50 days after the State executive branch officer files the required recommendation, the Commission shall issue an advisory opinion on that recommendation."
- 30 ILCS 608/5-10 (d) "No action may be taken to implement the recommendation for closure of a State facility until 50 days after the filing of any required recommendation."

The Act clearly would not allow for a vote by the Commission on Dec. 22, as such a vote would fall before the expiration of the public comment period on the department's

recommendation. As the Commission has always interpreted the "days" referenced in the Act as business days, the vote could not come before January 11, 2009. And as the Act bars the implementation for a full 50 days from the filing of the department's recommendation, such a premature vote would not advance the closure by a single day.

We look forward to presenting you information through the public processes required by the Act as you deliberate over the important issue of Thomson Correctional Center.

The main concern of the civil liberties community is not the sale per se of Thomson to the federal government. Nor is it the relocation of Guantanamo detainees to U.S. soil, which indeed many of us view as improving opportunities for minimal due process. Least of all is it the hysterical fear being whipped up that detainees will escape into the Illinois hinterland and sow terror.

We have two central issues to emphasize and call upon this commission to take them into account in forming its recommendation on this sale. First is the matter of INDEFINITE PREVENTIVE DETENION. Second is the imposition of "SUPER-MAX CONFINEMENT CONDITIONS WHICH ARE TANTAMOUNT TO TORTURE." ("Torture" here meaning infliction of severe pain and suffering within the meanings defined by U.S. law and international conventions to which the U.S. is signatory and which thereby have the effect of domestic law in the U.S.)

"Guantanamo North," as the prospective Thomson facility has been called, should not be permitted on the soil of Illinois and least of all should its arrival here be facilitated by a recommendation of this Commission, unless the U.S. government first provides binding assurance - possibly as a kind of restrictive covenant on the sale, that it WILL NOT IMPOSE TORTUOUS CONDITIONS (forbidden by the 8th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution) and that it WILL NOT HOLD ANY INMATES IN INDEFINITE PREVENTIVE DETENION.

Anthony Romero, Executive Director of the American Civil Liberties Union, issued a statement 15 December 2009 including the following points: "The creation of a 'Gitmo North' in Illinois is hardly a meaningful step forward. Shutting down Guantánamo will be nothing more than a symbolic gesture if we continue its lawless policies onshore.

"Alarmingly, all indications are that the administration plans to continue its predecessor's policy of indefinite detention without charge or trial for some detainees, with only a change of location. Such a policy is completely at odds with our democratic commitment to due process and human rights whether it's occurring in Cuba or in Illinois. In fact, while the Obama administration inherited the Guantánamo debacle, this current move is its own affirmative adoption of those policies. It is unimaginable that the Obama administration is using the same justification as the Bush administration used to undercut centuries of legal jurisprudence and the principle of innocent until proven guilty and the right to confront

one's accusers.

"It is also greatly disturbing that the administration will continue the use of military commissions, which are no more acceptable in Illinois or any other U.S. state than in Guantánamo. Despite some improvements, the commissions still fall far short of the legal standards necessary to comply with constitutional and international standards, allowing, for example, the use of coerced and hearsay evidence that would not be allowed in federal court. The proceedings will achieve neither reliable justice nor a restoration of America's credibility around the world.

"The administration must also make very clear what category of detainee will be transferred to Thomson in the future and what kind of prison conditions will apply. Detainees not charged with a crime should not be subject to punitive conditions meant for sentenced prisoners who have been found guilty in a court of law, and all conditions must comply with the Geneva Conventions.

"The administration will no doubt be looking to Congress for legislative buy-in for this facility, and as both branches work together, we strongly urge lawmakers to legislate responsibly and not set any policies or precedents for indefinite detention on U.S. soil, or create any violation of the Geneva Conventions.

"The Obama administration's announcement today contradicts everything the president has said about the need for America to return to leading with its values. American values do not contemplate disregarding our Constitution and skirting the criminal justice system. After detaining hundreds of individuals without the basic due process rights that define our justice system for almost eight years, it is time to charge suspects where evidence exists and repatriate and transfer the rest to countries where they won't be tortured."

On the same date, constitutional lawyer Glenn Greenwald offered the follwing observation on his Salon.com blog:

"There is, I suppose, symbolic value in closing Guantanamo. But what made Guantanamo such an affront to basic liberty and the rule of law was far more than symbolism, and it certainly had nothing to do with its locale. If anything, one could argue that it's now more dangerous to have within the U.S., on U.S. soil, a facility explicitly devoted to imprisoning people without charges. Even worse, by emphasizing that Thomson will be an even more 'secure' supermax than the utterly inhumane hellhole at Florence, Colorado — even boasting that it will be the 'most secure prison "of all time' — it's likely that individuals who have never been charged with any crime will be held indefinitely in a facility even worse than Guantanamo."

The strongly conservative editorial page of the <u>Wall Street Journal</u> yesterday raised the same issue:

"Savor the irony. Mr. Obama says he had to close Guantanamo because it offended American values and was a recruiting tool for terrorists. Yet like Dick Cheney, Mr. Obama is now defending indefinite detention and even military tribunals for some of the detainees who will relocate to Thomson. We doubt al

Qaeda will stop denouncing the U.S. merely because its comrades have moved to a state-side supermax. This is what happens when a new President rushes to fulfill a reckless campaign promise without a plan, or even much apparent thought."

David Savage, LA Times, 21 December 2009:

To hold the detainees who are not being tried, Obama relies on the Authorization for the Use of Military Force passed by Congress in the wake of the Sept. 11 attacks, according to a memo describing the legal argument prepared by the Defense Department for members of the Illinois delegation in Congress.

In addition, Obama has added a backup layer to the system that reviews the status of every detainee, going beyond judicial review to a periodic review by the executive branch, according to the memo.

Staffed by more than 60 attorneys and analysts from across the federal government, Obama's review panel has already done a preliminary examination of all Guantanamo cases and plans to make final decisions about disposition by early next year, the Pentagon document says.

At the moment, the category of inmates who can't be prosecuted and can't be released is empty -- "a null set," in the words of one official -- though there's little doubt the administration expects that to change. The White House is asking Congress to change federal law to allow detainees to be transported from Cuba to Illinois for that purpose.

"If we have to detain any without trial," said the senior administration official, "we will only do so as a last resort."

It is precisely the claim of authority to detain without trial even as a last resort that this Commission should deny to any prospective buyer of the Thomson facility. A constitutional and human rights issue of this magnitude may never have faced this body before. But it is here today; and whatever other entities of government seek or decide, you have a chance to make a statement that the Bill of Rights is more important that a real estate deal or some touted job creation.
